earn higher grades and score higher on tests;

graduate from high school and college;

develop self-confidence and motivation in the classroom; and

have better social skills and classroom behavior.

When parents are involved in education — at home and at school — their children tend to earn higher grades and pass from one grade to the next.

After analyzing 700 parent interviews, researchers Wendy Miedel and Arthur Reynolds **found** that 1st to 8th grade children whose parents participated in more activities consistently got higher grades, spent less time in special

education, and passed more grades. These findings held across all family backgrounds. <https://www.prodigygame.com>
